The children have been busy as usual this week with trips, outdoor learning, mask making (Greek and Lion King) as well as all the usual learning.

We look forward to welcoming you to the school next Friday for our Parents' Consultation Day. As well as talking to your child's class teacher, you will have the opportunity to look through the work your child has recently completed. It's been another productive week in **Year 3**! Here's a look at what we've been learning. This week in Literacy, we put the finishing touches on our non-chronological reports about dragons. The children have created some truly imaginative and detailed descriptions of these mythical creatures, including their habitats, diets, and special powers. One particularly mischievous dragon had a liking for tasty Year 3 teachers so we've been extra careful in the classroom! In our PSHE lessons, we have been learning about different jobs and the skills needed for them. The children were fascinated by the story of a 19-year-old entrepreneur who started his own pet food company because of his passion for caring for his chickens and dogs. His business has now gone global, showing that following your interests can lead to incredible opportunities! We discussed our own dreams and aspirations and the different skills that might help us achieve them. We explored Ancient Egyptian art by creating our own clay cartouches featuring scarab beetles. The children carefully shaped and designed their clay pieces, learning about the significance of scarabs in Egyptian culture. It was a messy but brilliant experience, and we can't wait to see the finished pieces next week. In History, we focused on understanding the importance of primary and secondary sources. We discussed how historians use different types of evidence to learn about the past and why it's important to consider where information comes from. The children enjoyed sorting different sources and identifying whether they were firsthand accounts or created later. This week, we built on our digital literacy skills by learning higher-level functions in Google Docs. The

children practised formatting text, inserting images, and using tools to enhance their writing. These skills will be really useful as we continue working on digital projects throughout the year. Fractions have been our focus this week in numeracy. We have explored unit fractions, non-unit fractions, and even begun looking at how fractions relate to division. The children have been working hard to compare and order fractions and solve real-world fraction problems. You can support their learning at home by asking them to spot fractions in everyday life for example, when sharing food or dividing objects into equal parts. This week's spelling focus has been the suffix -es. We've been breaking words down into root words, prefixes, and suffixes to deepen our understanding of word construction. Discussing these at home can really reinforce learning - perhaps challenge your child to come up with words that use this suffix and explain how they change when -es is added! The highlight of our week was definitely to finish with our first year 3's class assembly: 3H! The children put on a fantastic performance, showcasing confidence, teamwork and enthusiasm. A huge well done to Mrs Hamilton and all of 3H - you were incredible! Another exciting and busy week in **Year 4**. All classes have now enjoyed their activity days. We have spent a day at Butser Farm, a day outdoor learning bird watching and a day creating Iron Man. In History, we have also created clay masks, linked to Greek Theatre. In Maths, we have concluded our fractions unit and began applying this knowledge to decimals. In Literacy, we have started a new unit, exploring poetry and have created our own Haiku and Cinquains. We have continued to look at Hundertwasser in Art, which will help us with our homework. And finally, in Science we have explored how our ears hear sound and how sound travels.

It's been another busy week in **Year 5**, with some classes finishing their buggies that they have been diligently planning in DT. Other classes will have their opportunity over the coming weeks, which'll end with them being motorised! Within Literacy, the children have been continuing to write their own ending to the Firework Maker's Daughter. They have been creating their own problems that the characters have to overcome and will be writing their resolution next week. During Maths, we continue to look at decimals and have been looking at how to order, compare and round them. We

finished the week with our Outdoor Learning day for the term, it is always a time enjoyed by both children and adults alike! The children had the opportunity to partake in a nature scavenger hunt, create a nature crown and natural drawers - to name a few activities. This week in Year 6 we have started our new unit in Literacy on formal letters where we will be writing a formal letter of complaint. In Maths we have continued on with our measurement unit looking at area, perimeter and volume. In Science, we have been exploring how light reflects and can make shadows through a range of fun experiments. We have also incorporated our computing skills in this by using Sparkvideo and Seesaw to explore our experiment findings.

CELEBRATION ASSEMBLY

We continue with celebrating great behaviour and standards across the school in our Celebration Assembly. We have been particularly impressed by the improvement in lunchtime behaviour in the canteen where children have been going out of their way to make the space as pleasant as possible for the children coming later in the lunch hour.

The Year 5 boys have also had a busy week. On Tuesday they were in league action playing away to Walton Oak. This was their penultimate league game of the season and they knew a win would pretty much secure the league title. Walton Oak proved to be tricky opponents though through their workrate and determination. At half time, we found ourselves two goals ahead but knew we were capable of more. In the second half we went up a gear and ran out 5 v 0 winners which sets up the final game against Burhill on 1st April where the boys will hopefully lift the league title.

Then on Thursday, the boys played in the annual district tournament at Royal Holloway. This saw them compete in four group games which were a mixture of highs and lows for the boys. A 6 v 0 win against St James and a 3 v 0 win against Grovelands saw strong performances but a 0 v 0 against Ongar Place and a 1 v 0 loss against St Charles exposed our potential frailties. We finished 2nd in our group, qualifying for the quarter finals where we beat St Anne's comprehensively with a 3 v 0 win. In the semis we then played Holy Family and edged past them with a narrow 1 v 0 win. In the final we played St Cuthberts who had looked impressive all day. It was a really tight game but our opponents just edged it by a single goal. Well done to the boys who played, we just need to get greater consistency in performances and really roll up our sleeves and work hard when it's required.
