## THIS WEEK

Well done to all the children who have performed in our Tuning Up performances this week. It has been lovely to see all the progress you have made in a few short weeks. Thank you to all the parents who were able to attend.

Thank you also to everyone bringing bicycles and scooters to school who have been walking them safely into school through the bungalow and field gates. This arrangement will continue next week and until the uneven path at the front of the school is made safe.

As **Year 3** approach the final stretch before the Easter break, the children have been working incredibly hard across all subjects. With the warmer days arriving, we've been making the most of our outdoor learning opportunities while also keeping up with our exciting lessons in the classroom. Outdoor Learning Day: This week, the children had a fantastic time during our OLD, where they worked together to build dens for our little choo choos. It was wonderful to see their teamwork and creativity in action. Remember, shhh... don't let the secret out! In Maths we've started our lessons on Time, focusing on different ways to remember the number of days in each month. The children also completed their Spring assessments which will help us identify any areas that may need revisiting before we move forward. In Literacy we have continued exploring the story of George and the Dragon, with the children developing their understanding of the text and engaging in related activities. This week, our spelling focus was on the /oo/ sound, which can be spelled in different ways: oo, u, oul. The children worked with words such as look, book, should, would, and put: sorting them into the correct columns and identifying patterns. In Art, check out our wonderful completed cartouches in 'This Week in Photos'. In Science our topic on plants and seed dispersal continues, with the children investigating how different plants spread their seeds to grow in new places. In RE, we have been discussing how belonging to a group helps us develop our identity, encouraging thoughtful conversations about the importance of community and belonging. As we near the Easter break, the children are beginning to feel a little tired, and a well-earned rest is just around the corner! We hope you enjoy the sunshine

and the longer, lighter days ahead. Finally, we want to wish all our wonderful mums, grandmas, and carers a Happy Mother's Day for Sunday! We hope you have a lovely day filled with love and appreciation. Another action packed week in **Year 4** has passed as we start to look forward to Easter, wrapping up our learning about Lent in RE, creating fact files. This week in Literacy we analysed a non-chronological report, ready to write our own on the Ancient Greeks. We have learnt more about the food they ate, their clothing, their hobbies and what their homes were like. In Maths, we have learnt about tenths and hundredths as decimals, whilst in PSHE we have been learning about how to spend and be sensible with money, exploring budgeting. In PE, we have enjoyed choreographing dance routines inspired by the Ancient Greeks and this week we added some modern Greek dancing into our routines, which was certainly fun! The children have explored how sound travels over a distance in Science and in History we have learnt about the fall of the Greeks and the rise of the Romans. Lastly, in Art we have sketched our final designs of our architecture inspired by Hundertwasser, ready to create our final pieces next week.

This week, **Year 5** had a visit from acclaimed author and retired concorde pilot John Tye! The children came out of their talk inspired - maybe we have some future pilots in our classes. Within Literacy, we have been building towards writing an explanation text about surviving in a remote location. The children will choose to write about an arctic landscape, rainforest or deserted island. They decided to write about a shelter, making a rescue signal, finding useful items and food & water. These are going to be fantastic to read next week! During Science, we looked at the human life cycle and the stages of development we go through. We are coming towards the end of our DT unit, where the children have been putting their finishing touches on their buggies they have made. Some now, will have had the motorised unit added and the children have been using their coding skills to get their buggy moving. The rest of the buggies will be finished next week. Another great week in **Year 6** this week! In Art we have been exploring a range of environmentally friendly artists that use plastic to create interesting sculptures and models. We have been using these artists to help inspire us as we start to think of our own ideas for our own plastic

sculptures. We have also started our new Literacy unit on the fantastic book Floodlands by Marcus Sedgwick. In this unit we will look at the concepts of flashbacks and will incorporate a flashback into a creative, detailed narrative.

## PATH CLOSURE

From **Monday 24th March**, we will be repairing the pathway that leads from the front entrance to the GAP entrance, therefore the path will be closed and out of use until further notice.

access to secure your bikes and scooters.

If your child attends Early Risers, please ensure they disembark at the front gate and **walk** to the cycle racks to put their bikes/scooters away before going to Early Risers.
