It seems like the weeks are just flying past as we find ourselves at Friday once again. The year 6 pupils have had a great week down in Liddington and like every trip so far this year, they had a fabulous time!

It's been another busy week in Year 3 and we have been continuing with our unit on informal and formal letters. This week, we have been comparing the two different styles of letter and identifying similarities and differences. Pupils have also been planning, writing and uplevelling a formal letter to Goldilocks' parents from Mummy and Daddy Bear complaining about all of the damage she caused in their house. In maths, we have started our unit on addition and subtraction and have been revisiting column methods and practising calculations involving exchanging. In RE, we have been learning about the key values of Humanism and finding out what happens at a Humanist naming ceremony. In computing, we have continued with our work on Stop Motion Animation and pupils have thoroughly enjoyed planning their storyboards and starting to create their short films. This week in literacy, Year 4 have started writing our Beowulf hot tasks. The children have really enjoyed writing their fight scenes and starting to identify what speech they would like to include. In maths we have continued our study on geometry with a focus on quadrilaterals. We continue our focus on healthy eating in Science, looking at case studies of people and the food they eat and creating recommendations to help them have a healthier lifestyle. In computing we are all very excited to start our unit on 3D printing. The children are learning about the programme we use and experimenting with how it works. We are now coming to the end of our art unit on weaving. The children have tried different weaving techniques and have created some fantastic outcomes which they will bring home shortly.

It has been a busy week in **Year 5** preparing for the residential performance that took place on Wednesday evening. All of the children performed their poems confidently and really showcased the activities that they participated in during their time in the Isle of Wight. In literacy, the children have started explanation texts about coastal erosion, which they will start to plan and write next week. In geography, Y5 is continuing to learn about volcanoes and where they can be found in the world. This week the majority of **Year 6** have been enjoying themselves on our residential trip to PGL Liddington. We have all been extremely proud of them throughout our stay. The children have behaved beautifully; they have been polite and

respectful to all teachers, parent helpers and the PGL staff. Furthermore, they have all supported and encouraged each other in all activities and have been an absolute pleasure to be with. All the children have challenged themselves through participating in a wide range of activities, including cannoning, abseiling, vertical challenges, sensory trail, orienteering, Jacob's ladder, giant swing and many many more...Thank you very much to the parent helpers that accompanied us there. Meanwhile back in Weybridge, the non-trippers have had an equally rewarding and enjoyable time at school and have also behaved extremely well. They have used the mountain bikes, been trampolining, played badminton, completed numerous art activities, including making clay pots. They have furthered their knowledge of 3D printing and experienced the VR goggles. Finally, they had a great time at Jump In, during their off site trip. All in all, everyone in Year 6 has had a fantastically fun and memorable week!
