APPOINTMENTS

All medical and dental appointments should be notified in advance to the Welfare Officer via absence@cleves.co.uk and Class Teacher. Where possible (emergencies being the exception) such appointments should be kept to a minimum as many doctors and dentists offer surgeries outside of school times. However, if appointments have to be made during school hours, it is expected that the pupil will return promptly after the appointment. If for some reason this is not possible, parents should contact the Welfare Officer to discuss before making the decision not to return to school.

HALF TERM READING OPPORTUNITIES

Reading is fundamental to children's future outcomes and half term is a great time to explore reading for pleasure opportunities. Children should be allowed to explore the types of texts that interest them and use them to relax, empathise and find out interesting facts that they are interested in. Opportunities to extend this are plentiful during holidays: Walton Library is hosting a free event on Monday about animation and a free create a creature workshop about endangered animals on Friday. Staines Library is hosting a production of Mrs Armitage on Wheels with a pay what you can afford tariff. Simply taking your child to the library to explore a range of books is a very cost-effective way of opening opportunities for reading for

pleasure. Signing up to the library is free, and comes with access to the Libby app that provides free ebooks and audiobooks. For a slightly higher cost, The Week Junior Book Festival is also taking place in the Barbican Centre in London on 29th October with a lineup of authors such as Michael Rose, Joseph Coelho, Cressida Cowell and A.F. Steadman and twelve interactive workshops to choose from, book signings and a marketplace. The London Literature Festival at the Southbank Centre also has some events for families, including Kiran Millwood Hargrave talking about her new Geomancer Trilogy. Happy reading!

PARKING

We have received a report this week from a parent and local resident regarding a child almost being hit by a car at the end of the school day due to some parents parking illegally during pick-up. Surrey Parking Enforcement have been contacted in regards to parking at both the start and end of the school day. Please ensure that when doing pick-ups and drop-offs that you park both legally and considerately, even if that means parking further away and walking the remaining distance.

ZONES OF REGULATION

We have recently revisited the zones of regulation approach that we launched across the school last year and this has included

refresher training for both teachers and learning support assistants. Zones of regulation is a simple approach which helps children to develop an awareness of their emotions, to develop self-regulation and practise managing difficult emotions. Self-regulation refers to the best state of alertness or energy for a given situation. The zones of regulation aims to teach children strategies to help them acknowledge and cope with these feelings so they can get back to feeling calm and ready to learn. In school, staff have recapped (or introduced for Year 3s) the four different coloured zones and the emotions associated with these as well as discussing different strategies that could help them when they are in each zone. Each class

has a zones of regulation display and, after half term, we are introducing daily check ins at the start of and during the day to encourage pupils to think about how they are currently feeling and what might help to move into the green zone (which is the best zone for learning) in a supportive, non-pressurised way.
