

It's been a busy week back in **Year 3** and we have started our new literacy unit on informal and formal letters. Pupils really enjoyed our hook lesson where we explored lots of different stories which include letters including The Jolly Postman, The Day the Crayons Quit and Meerkat Mail, identifying the difference between informal and formal letters. We also looked at two examples of informal letters, picking out the key features of one and uplevelling another. In maths, we have been learning about mass and converting measurements in kilograms and grams, comparing and ordering mass as well as reading scales with different intervals. Next week, we will be moving on to capacity. In our games lessons, we are continuing with our striking and fielding rotation of sports including cricket, tennis, athletics and outdoor and adventurous activities. Pupils are also really excited about their first Cleves sports day next week! We have officially begun our final half term of Year 4 and we have gotten off to a fantastic start! We have a very exciting few weeks coming up and we cannot wait to get started! We have begun our new Unit in Literacy based on the saga of Erik the Viking. We are creating our own sidekick as they help the mighty hero battle an evil enchantress. To help us with our writing, in PAG we have been looking at prepositions and how we can implement this when writing our own battle scenes. We have all been working hard in Maths as we keep practising our times tables and develop our prior knowledge on decimals. Our athletic skills have been put to the test as we are having lots of fun practising on the field in preparation for Sports Day. Then in Games, all classes will be playing either tennis, rounders or cricket as we change every couple of weeks. We are also using all what we learnt during Hooke Court to develop our understanding of the Anglo-Saxons and their tribes in Britania. As well as all of this, we are busy practising for our residential assembly next week! Well done everyone on a wonderful first week back and have a great weekend!

What a great first week back we have had in **Year 5**! During Topic, we have dived straight back into learning about the different types of erosion that occur at our coasts and have used the knowledge gained from our Isle of Wight trip to the Needles! Within Literacy, we have spent the week looking at the different types of coastal erosion and how we can put this information into an explanation text to

We spent some time making viewfinders and then explored the school grounds looking for visual observations of nature to capture on digital media. During PE, we have continued on with our athletics unit and have really developed our techniques with running and jumping - perfect timing for our upcoming Sports Day next week! Year 6 have come back from half term well rested and ready for their final few weeks at Cleves and what a busy one it will be. Production rehearsals are well underway and the children need to continue to practice their lines and/or songs. This week we have started a first person narrative about a German pilot who has crash landed in Britain. The children have thought of incredibly descriptive vocabulary ready to write the first action sequence on Monday. We have also been learning about the Blitz and writing letters as children who witnessed these events. We ended the week with our World War II immersion day, where the children found out they were going to be evacuated at the beginning of the day. They had to decide what to pack and practice getting under desks in case there was an air raid. In the afternoon they 'travelled' to Devon and discovered who their host families would be. Some children were lucky and others were not. The day ended with the evacuees playing traditional games on the playground. 








FETE IN THE FIELD MUSICIANS

INTERNET SAFETY GUIDE

OmeTV is an emerging social networking app that aims to let its users connect, ideally forming new friendships or simply getting to meet interesting people from all around the world. It's not particularly new technology, but it's remained popular amongst younger audiences. OmeTV uses video chats to randomly connect its users, much like its better-known sister app, Omegle.

Unfortunately, OmeTV still carries the same risks as its competitors. With so many users being so lightly regulated, there's real potential for some unpleasant characters to make use of the app. This guide dives into OmeTV, highlighting the risks and advising you on how to keep your child safe on the app.
